PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

If you listen close, can you almost hear it? There, in the distance? It's getting closer! It's the Sound of the Shofar, which means, the High Holy days are almost here!

This year, at Mountain Synagogue, the days of Awe begin with a special Rosh Hashanah evening service as it falls on Friday, September 15, which also happens to be Shabbat. Our first day services will continue on Saturday, September 16, but technically, Rosh Hashanah continues until sundown Sunday evening.

Literally, Rosh Hashanah means "Head of the Year", as it is the beginning of the Jewish new year. It is the first of the High Holidays or "Days of Awe", ending 10 days later with Yom Kippur.

This two-day festival marks the anniversary of human creation – and the special relationship between humans and God, the creator.

Rosh Hashanah begins with the sounding of the shofar, an instrument made of a ram's horn, proclaiming God as king of the Universe, just as a trumpet would be sounded at a king's coronation. IN fact, Rosh Hashanah is described in the Torah as Yom Teru'ah, a day of sounding (the Shofar).

The sound of the shofar is also a call to repentance – to wake up and re-examine our commitment to God and to correct our ways. Thus begins the "Ten Days of repentance" which ends with Yom Kippur, the Day of Atonement.

For those that may not be familiar with High Holy Day traditions, the traditional way to wish someone a happy new Year in Hebrew is by saying "Shana Tova". In Hebrew this means "A Good Year".

There are many traditions associated with Rosh Hashanah, including the following:

- Attending synagogue and spending time with family and friends
- Reflecting on the year before and repenting for any wrongdoings and then reflecting on the year ahead to start afresh.
- Wearing white and new clothes, symbolizing purity
- And as mentioned above, there is the sounding of the ram's horn "shofar" on both mornings.
- Every evening, candles are lit. candles are often a symbol of remembrance.
- On the first day of Rosh Hashanah, the Tashlich ceremony is performed. This involves visiting a body of water to symbolically cast away past sins.
- Spicy, sharp, or sour foods are avoided in favor of sweet delicacies, representing wishes for a sweet and pleasant year (not a bitter year). Nuts are also avoided.

Like many of our holidays, food plays an important role. Some of the symbolic foods include:

- Apples dipped in honey (eaten on the first night)
- Round challah dipped in honey and sprinkled with
- A new seasonal fruit (on the second night)
- Pomegranates (as its many seeds symbolize the hope the year will be rich with many blessings.)

As we continue to have services in-person and online via Zoom, having your own prayer books at home is important to follow along. Our Mishkan t'Filah prayer books are available for \$40 each. Our new High Holiday Mahzor's are available for \$40 each.
