#### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

#### **Psychological Kin**

When a friend dies the impact can be as traumatic as losing a family member. Recently, Mountain Synagogue has lost several good friends. Rhoda Haber and Leslie Hughes, both board members and longtime members of our congregation, have recently passed away, and we mourn their passing. People can understand the grieving process when it's your family, but sometimes, when a friend dies, the impact can be as traumatic as losing a family member.

The death of a friend is a loss that most people face at some point in their lives – often many times. But it is a grief that may not be taken as seriously by employers, doctors or others. The so-called hierarchy of grief, a scale used to determine who is considered a more legitimate mourner than others, puts family members at the top. For this reason, the death of a close friend can feel shunted to the periphery and has been described as a disenfranchised grief.

The article I read about this struck me, published May 13, 2019, from theconversation.com, as death seems to be on most people's minds these days. The devastating earthquake catastrophe in Turkey and Syria numbs us with astounding numbers, even as we rejoice when a survivor is pulled from the rubble.

Yet, there has not been much research on the impact the death of a friend has on a person, so in the article, they set out to address this with a recent study. They discovered that, far from being a trivial loss, the health and well-being of people who lose a close friend has a heavy toll in the four years after that loss.

In that study, published in PLOS ONE, they analyzed responses from an Australian household survey of more than 26,000 people. Of the people who completed the survey, over 9,500 had experienced the death of a close friend. The analysis showed that life satisfaction of the bereaved fell sharply compared with a matched non-bereaved group. There is a large and sharp drop in this life satisfaction from month 3-9, and then another smaller yet still sizable drop at months 19-21.

Social functioning and mental health are also worse after the death of a friend, not surprisingly. These findings suggest we need to take the death of a close friend more seriously and to change the way we support people who are suffering from such a bereavement.

Friends are psychological kin, that is, you may even have a stronger bond with friends than people you are related to by birth or marriage. So, when a friend dies, the psychological and emotional stress can be as bad as the death of kin. The psychological help bereaved people receive is not the same across the board, and we should strive to help and change this as we begin to accept the idea that close friends can be considered psychological kin.
